

<u>June 1, 1999</u>: The National Mediation Board (NMB) certifies AMFA as the representative for Northwest Airlines mechanic and related.

May 11, 2001: The contract is signed.

<u>May 14, 2001</u>: Northwest Airlines management implements the largest farm-out of mechanic's work in the airline's history.

<u>May 18, 2001</u>: Northwest Airlines begins furloughing mechanics. Furloughs continue on a quarterly basis.

<u>October, 2002</u>: Northwest announces the closing of its Minneapolis maintenance facility.

<u>August 20, 2005</u>: Approximately 4,750 remaining mechanic and related members of AMFA at Northwest go on strike against the company.

October 9, 2006: Strike ends with all AMFA workers still on strike converted to lay-off status with 5 - 10 weeks severance pay.

October 29, 2008: Delta Airlines and Northwest Airlines merger is complete, Northwest ceases to exist.

AMFA Members at Northwest Airlines never got to vote on the company's final offer.

There was NO STRIKE VOTE.

AMFA had NO STRIKE FUND.
